

Your Committee on Resources and Development, to which was jointly referred the National Government's proposed FY2004 budget, begs leave to report as follows:

Pursuant to rule 7, section 2(b), of the Official Rules of Procedure of the Thirteenth Congress of the Federated States of Micronesia, your committee has limited its review to those portions of the proposed budget relating to matters within its jurisdiction. These are the budget for:

Your committee conducted a series of public hearings and committee meetings following the convening of Congress on May 11, 2003. The report and recommendations that follow are based upon the information and input provided by the Secretary, directors, and staff of the various offices and entities interviewed during those hearings as well as the most recent National Government Expenditure and Performance Reports.

### GENERAL COMMENTS

Your committee wishes to thank and express its appreciation to the members of the Department of Economic Affairs and the various agencies and organizations represented for their continued dedication and diligence in fulfilling their respective missions. The committee is also pleased to note that the proposed budget for the

Department of Economic Affairs is again reduced when compared to the previous fiscal year. We encourage the Secretary and his staff to continue their efforts to improve fiscal responsibility within the Department while maintaining high quality services.

Your committee notes that this is the fourth fiscal year in which the budget is presented under the National Government's "Performance Budgeting" process. The committee understands that the goal of Performance Budgeting is to grant executive personnel broad discretion as a means to more efficiently implement the general policy directions of this Congress. The committee remains committed to this principle. However, the committee also has a duty to closely monitor the activities of the agencies under its supervision and where appropriate, to comment and provide direction regarding those activities.

The committee cannot fulfill its responsibility without accurate information presented in a clear and simple format. The Department and agencies are encouraged to continue to improve the quality of their communication to Congress. We are hopeful that more complete quarterly Expenditure and Performance Reports will be a positive step in that direction. We also encourage the Department and agencies to continue their efforts to refine both this tool and the performance budget provided in the proposed annual budget.

However, at this time these documents do not provide to Congress a clear picture of the economic challenges facing our Nation and the strategic plans that are now in place to address those challenges. For this reason, the committee requests that each Department unit and agency within its jurisdiction prepare a summary report to the committee that clearly describes the major economic challenges within their area of responsibility and the strategic plan(s) that are now in place, or will soon be in place, to meet those challenges. These reports should also clearly describe the mission and objectives of each unit or agency and include a listing of their precise functions. These reports should be provided to the committee prior to the time the 2003 Economic Summit is convened.

The committee is greatly concerned about current executive branch efforts to reduce expenditures through "across the board" cuts. The committee believes that "across the board" cuts violate the fundamental premises upon which performance based budgeting can be successfully developed in our country and urges the President and his cabinet to make future budget decisions on a performance basis.

While the committee does not seek to "micro-manage" the purchasing functions of those agencies and offices within its jurisdiction, we do believe that the National Government should actively pursue a program to create a bulk purchasing mechanism for computer equipment. It is our understanding that such a program was considered in the past, but abandoned. We would encourage the Department to take the lead in collaboration with the Department of Finance and Administration in re-instituting that effort. We believe that the Department's expertise in cost-benefit analysis could contribute to such an effort.

The committee has similar concerns regarding maintenance and repair of computers and other equipment. We note that many offices and departments allocate funds for these functions. We suggest that it may be more economical and more efficient to consolidate these functions in one office that would provide services to the entire National Government. Again, we would encourage the Department to use its resources together with those of the Department of Finance and Administration to develop such a program.

The committee has noted a number of position vacancies and urges that they be filled at the earliest possible time and that qualified personnel are available. Where positions remain vacant for a considerable period of time, the continuing need for that position should be carefully re-evaluated.

The committee continues its caution that the Department and each of the agencies and offices under its jurisdiction should limit international travel to absolutely necessary activities, and focus their resources on increasing collaboration with their appropriate counterparts among the States. Toward that end, we request that no more than one-third of the Departments travel funds be utilized for international travel and that both foreign and domestic travel be better coordinated within and among Departments and agencies of the government. Where international travel to conferences does occur, the committee requests follow-up reports that document the specific benefits to the country of those trips.

The committee strongly recommends that the Department and agencies continue to critically examine their missions. The committee encourages the Department and agencies to further minimize administrative overhead, clarify staff responsibilities, and place staff, to the extent possible, in the field where the Nation may gain tangible benefits.

It will be necessary for the committee to receive more candid, complete assessments of Department and agency issues and needs. Presently, there does not appear to be a strategic focus for the economic development of our country. The committee intends to

work closely with the Department of Economic Affairs and related agencies to achieve this focus and expand the economy of our country in the coming years.

### Summary of Major Budget Changes

Overall the Department of Economic Affairs recommended budget is approximately \$130,000 (10 %) less than their FY2003 appropriated budget. Personnel costs have remained flat while all other areas of the Department's budget have been reduced by at least 15%.

Recommended funding for the Boards, Commissions, authorities and Special Programs under the jurisdiction of this committee has, in total, also been reduced below FY 2003 appropriated budgets by approximately 10% and the recommended air freight subsidy is less than one-half of the amount last granted to the National Fisheries Corporation.

Grants, Contributions and Capital and Human Resources Development programs have increased due to a significant number of new program initiatives that are being undertaken by the Department of Economic Affairs to create improved conditions for economic expansion in our country.

### FINDINGS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

Your committee presented its preliminary findings and recommendations in Standing Committee Report No. 13-11 ("SCR No. 13-11"). Although adopted by the committee and placed on the Congressional Calendar for action, Members deferred action on SCR No. 13-11 to the next session of Congress.

Thereafter, your committee's report was included, along with those of Congress' other standing committees, in a letter transmitted to the President of the Federated States of Micronesia. The letter indicated that, because many issues regarding budget procedures under the Amended Compact remained unresolved, the standing committee reports were merely "advisory" in nature.

Congress convened its Second Special Session of the Thirteenth Congress on August 25, 2003, to enact the FY 2004 Budget and to conduct other business. On August 27, 2003, Congress recommitted SCR No. 13-11 to enable the committee to make its final recommendations.

This standing committee report reflects the final recommendations of your Committee on Resources and Development regarding the proposed FY 2004 Budget. Accordingly, your committee offers the following recommendations.

This unit was added to the Department in FY 2000. The unit is responsible for facilitating the conversion of certain public enterprises to private companies and to increase productivity and efficiency among those public enterprises inappropriate for transfer to the private sector.

The unit has been staffed by consultants since its inception. The Department stated in FY2001 that it expected this to continue for the next 2-4 years. The Department indicated then that Asian Development Bank officials have stated that they could continue the technical assistance in this area for a 2-4 year period on an intermittent basis. The committee has in the past encouraged the Department to integrate Department staff into this program as soon as possible, with the ultimate goal of phasing out external staff, and does so again at this time.

The committee notes that the program has now been in effect for approximately four years at a cost in excess of \$200,000. The committee strongly urges that the Department re-evaluate this program and determine whether to integrate the program into the Department.

The FY2001 committee report noted: "a significant projected communications expense (\$8,800). This expense reflects the cost of coordinating with the States to implement the Biological Diversity Project. The Project is generally funded by the United Nations Global Environment Facility. The Project will study current laws and regulations addressing the protection of biological diversity in the FSM and prepare a summary of the situation for presentation to the United Nations Convention on the Global Environment. The second phase of the Project will recommend and help implement improvements to the current regulatory and informational framework," by February 1, 2004.

The committee notes that the Department also received \$8,800 in FY2002 and FY2003. The committee would like the Department to report on the status of this program and its recommendations to improve the "current regulatory and informational framework."
